PROGRAM BEGINS.

(Reunion Chairman, PETE ZELINSKY, ENTERS THE STAGE.)

PETE

(PETE EXITS as KATHY WOODHALL ENTERS STAGE.)

(KATHY leads the CLASS in a moment of silence.)

(KATHY EXITS as TOM STRIENER, walks ONSTAGE in his iconic Homecoming "Boy on the Float" costume, short-panted lederhosen, suspenders, cap and carries a large silver spoon.)

TOM

Anybody seen my float?? It's about ten feet high, chocolate ice cream soda, with whipped cream, a straw, a big cherry on top...

I parked it outside and I think it might've been towed...

Well, here I am again after fifty years... And if you thought I felt ridiculous THEN!...

But being famous in high school as "The Kid on the Ice Cream Float" had its upside and led to bigger things. I had a long and lucrative career as one of the Keebler Elves... I was a "Pinocchio" at Disney World for ten years... I even dated Snow White...

Call me sentimental, but I kept my original hat, my silver spoon...

And after all these years I'm proud to say I kept my 'cherry'...

But tonight, I want to say I still have plenty of school spirit.

And school spirit is what these next ladies are all about... Let's give a big class welcome to our Gateway High Cheerleaders, Kathy

(TOM leads the APPLAUSE, then EXITS as the CHEERLEADERS run ONSTAGE.)

(The CHEERLEADERS perform a cheer and an encore.)

(As the CHEERLEADERS EXIT to APPLAUSE, classmate RICK SHRUM ENTERS STAGE.)

RICK

Good evening, everyone, I'm Rick Shrum. As the United States put a man on the moon in 1969, Gateway High School was reaching new frontiers on earth by putting its mighty Gator football team on the field in November to play the Altoona Mountain Lions for the W.P.I.A.L. Championship at Pitt Stadium...

(FOOTBALL PHOTOS UP.)

The Gateway Gators had run the table in the regular season and was now about to claim its first state title ever by beating Altoona 22 to 15, under the leadership of our beloved Head Coach "Pete" Antimarino. Gateway had indeed, reached the "highest high" in our football history.

It was a special season with exceptional players, including starting tight end, sophomore Vince Lamberti, from the Class of '71.

The Gators repeated the feat again in 1972 and 1974, but the 1969 team will always be the first, with an action packed, white knuckling victory that we will forever remember.

The Gateway Basketball team was also making a lot of noise in the city of Pittsburgh...

The Gator team had "championship" on its mind in the fall of 1970 under the command of Head Coach Art Betts.

The Gators won a sectional title over Penn Hills and advanced to the W.P.I.A.L. Finals in the spring of 1971, but lost in a heartbreaker to Farrell, 50-49, in the final seconds that was watched by over 11,000 fans at the Civic Arena. A remarkable run it was and we commemorate their amazing championship stand tonight.

Athletes learned the fundamentals and skills to compete, but they also learned sportsmanship and fair play, which the ancient Greeks envisioned as the Olympian ideal.

They imbued in our competitors the importance of integrity and character, attributes that they would carry throughout life.

And we thank them.

The man at the top in sports was our Athletic Director, Mr. Furrie...

Mr. Henry Furrie. Just the mention of the name makes our spines straighten while putting on our best behaviors. Mr. Furrie was loved, respected, admired by all. And sometimes a little feared as we all tried to stay in line and on his good side. Towering at six feet four inches, barrel chested, wearing a crew cut that never seemed out of style, he was a rock who kept order and the faith at Gateway High.

And though he was tough as a Woolworth's steak, you knew his door was always open and that you had a friend in Mr. Furrie.

As I close, I'd like to add that my love of sports and career as a sports writer has been inspired and forged by the many fine men and women who participated in Gateway's outstanding athletic program. You truly made them 'Glory Days' for all of us. Thank you.

Can we all give another hand to our returning cheerleaders for getting their pom-poms out of mothballs to cheer for us one more time...

Barb, Alex, Mary, Pat,... And the entire 1971 varsity squad, JoAnne Enterline and Sue Gibson, our Gateway Cheerleaders...

(APPLAUSE.)

"School spirit." What is it? How do you get it? And why is it important we have it? A good question because in a school with over two thousand students there are about THAT many expressions of it.

Is it only about pep rallies, proms and homecoming or can it be food drives, trash pickups or volunteering for the yearbook committee?

I guess school spirit is a lot like faith, in that it embodies both an inward, personal feeling and an outward expression. For me, I guess I've always had it. "Once a cheerleader, always a cheerleader." Even today, I'll go into a Starbucks and yell... (MAKES A CHEERLEADER "T" WITH HER ARMS)... "GIMME A TEA!!"

School spirit does do one essential thing. It unifies us as a class and a school. It is a direct reflection of our values and what we want our school to say about us. "This is who we are, this is what we stand for." In a way, the "great dress code walk out" was school spirit in action. One thing for sure is that it's alive in this room tonight by the fact you're all here fifty years after graduation. I think that deserves a cheer... (Leads CLASS in a "YAY FOR US!")

Gateway's great feats on the playing field are a team effort and our Marching Band played its part in many a victory...

The Gateway Marching Band... With plumed caps and braided epaulets, marching bands are a staple of high school sport. Marching in formation with piccolos, woodwinds and tubas with synchronized steps to Beatles medleys and homages to Mary Poppins, they had everyone's adrenaline pumping and spirits soaring.

And leading the charge for the Marching Band every Friday night were Gateway High's Majorettes...

Our team of outstanding, charismatic and athletic girls, who probably dated a LOT, all marching in time, in unison, while tossing batons high in the air then catching and twirling them without a fumble.

... The School Mascot is a widely loved, oversized member of our high school community. They exist to represent the school, show pride and build spirit. Mascots can be anything, Warriors, Vikings, Giants, Minute Men... Though if I were a guy on the football team I don't think I'd like it getting around that I was a "Minute Man."

But mascots usually come from the animal kingdom; Bulldogs, Bears, Wolverines, Ducks... Most of which are ill tempered, mangy with terrible breath. They represent valued sporting traits such as fierce athleticism, speed and grace, which in our case, are one in the same
- Bobby Grace.

(APPLAUSE as KATHY EXITS STAGE as BERNIE MUKO ENTERS.)

Good evening, I'm Bernie Muko and I'm here to pay tribute to our Gateway High teachers. Fifty years ago, that line would've been met with a chorus of boos at any assembly. And it's a credit to their influence that we have matured enough to refrain.

They are, as a group and individually, largely responsible for who we are today. They've had a lasting impact in ways we never dreamed. Einstein said, "An education is what is left after the lesson is over."

We all had our faves and we all had some whom we'd draw unflattering pictures of in our notebooks. They were as varied a group as we were as students, all with different personalities, looks, quirks, moods, good sides and bad. Mr. Maxwell, Mrs. Bash, Mr. Moody,

Mrs. Sproul, Mrs. Baldy, Mr. Vrable, Mrs. Neff and our eccentric social studies teacher, Thomas Boory, who is immortalized by reciting, "The Night before Christmas" and cutting off his own tie with a scissors... Each one of them knew their subject and had their unique way of teaching it. Some drilled, some encouraged, some cajoled, some were funny, some even threatened with eighth period detention. They all had their own method and style of imparting their lessons and were effective and united in one objective, to teach us something of value. But we learned, in spite of our young, restless and fidgety selves. We knew something about the world we lived in. I am proud of my early public school education and wouldn't trade it for anything. We were a well-rounded bunch. We could read and write -- in cursive! We could spell, diagram a sentence, add, subtract, multiply and divide. We can work a drill press, speak French, climb a rope, carry a tune and tell you who invented the light bulb, and what AU is on the periodic table.

(To the CLASS) AU... Anybody??...

(The CLASS replies) ...GOLD!!

Right! Uranium, magnesium... chiseled into our memories for all time.

Naming the states and their capitols??... Not a problem.

Try asking a high school senior today to find Kansas on a map.

Classrooms at times may have felt like a penal colony, especially those first periods on cold February mornings. Roomfuls of dazed, glassy eyed kids and teachers trying to get them to focus. To us, yeah, a penal colony. To them, it was sacred ground, and on those cold February mornings they were there freezing along with us.

Teaching is a special calling. They sure weren't in it for the money. But they gave their best to us every day. And tonight we honor them. One of the greatest educators of all came from Pittsburgh and you all know him as Mr. Rogers. And when you think about your early educators, he offered this... "Take a second to think about your teachers, and how pleased they would've been to know the difference you feel they've made to you." They truly cared and wanted the best for us. And every one of them is part of us today. Ladies and gentlemen, to our teachers.

(APPLAUSE.)

Throughout our entire history of attending school, from kindergarten to graduation, each of us had a silent fear of being sent to the Principal's office. And for good reason as this was the seat of all authority. You were coming face to face with "THE ENFORCER." And if your offense was worthy of his attention, start genuflecting!

(MR. O'TOOLE PHOTO UP.)

We were fortunate to have Mr. O'toole as ours as he had the right mix of attributes to be an effective Warden -- Principal, excuse me...

He was all that a Principal had to be, no nonsense, strong, fair, tough, but reasonable. In his rumpled dark suit, white shirt and tie, he was a fixture at all functions, games, ceremonies, plays, concerts. And once you got past the intimidation factor he was very approachable and a really terrific guy.

Mary Tyler Moore had her "Lou Grant," we had Mr. O'toole. And he didn't have it easy dealing with such a big school, students, faculty, parents, School Board and the community. But he kept order, and his cool, all during the turbulent sixties with its protests, sit ins and walkouts. Mr. O'toole believed a good Principal follows good principles. Mr. O'toole was a good Principal and a good man. We thank and salute our Principal, Mr. O'toole.

Just outside his office, sitting at her desk was the warm and cuddly face of authority, Mrs. Hackman.

Mrs. Hackman was an institution in her own right, known and loved by every one of us. Part assistant, part mother figure, part friend, confidante and problem solver to all students whose requests and demands on her time were endless, but she juggled it all flawlessly.

But most of her time seemed to be taken up waving back to the hordes of students passing by her office window. Thank you and bless you, Mrs. Hackman.

Our class was many things in many areas. One thing it definitely was was smart. Our Class Valedictorian, Marica Gottfried...

The smartest of the smart, the brightest of the bright, straight A's every semester, aced her SAT's, Ivy League scholarships pouring in. E=MC squared??... Kid's stuff. If "Jeopardy" was on back then she'd STILL be reigning champion. Not only was she brilliant, she was a wonderful, kind and popular classmate person to boot. Please join me in recognizing our Class Valedictorian, Marcia Gottfried.

(APPLAUSE. PHOTO OUT.)

It was customary for many high schools to have Foreign 'Exchange Student' programs where students from other countries to come to the states for a year to study and learn about our culture. And vice versa.

Gateway was the host high school to a Swedish student, Bjorn Fernander, who had the coolest hair on a guy at school. It's a good thing Bjorn didn't arrive at Gateway a year earlier during the 'Dress

Code' crackdown... "Welcome to Gateway, Bjorn. Now go home for three days, you're suspended." We tried to contact him and invite him to the reunion but 'Fornander' is like 'Smith' in Scandanavia and we never could find him. But Bjorn, we're glad you were a member of the great Class of '71. And I'm glad to be one too. Thank you.

(BERNIE EXITS STAGE to APPLAUSE as BARB CIAO BEHRLE ENTERS.)

Hi, I'm Barb Ciao Behrle. Gateway High School made history again in 1971 with its production of the hit Broadway musical, "Brigadoon." Never before had Gateway High School produced and performed a musical on its stage, as "Brigadoon" was not only the first musical, but the largest theatrical undertaking presented before the Monroeville community.

As we all remember, for five consecutive nights in March of 1971 sold out audiences were thrilled, delighted and enchanted by the story of a mythical Scottish town that comes to life every hundred years.

This stellar production came to life under the direction of Gateway's own Musical Director, Mr. V. Lee Harrity. (PHOTO UP.)

The cast included singers, dancers, musicians and actors from all three grades. But our production of "Brigadoon" achieved something beyond five glorious nights of entertainment. (PHOTO UP.)

The abundant proceeds from the musical funded the Senior Choir's participation in the International Festival of Music being held in England in the summer of 1971. Little did we realize at the time that Gateway was making so much history that year.

(APPLAUSE as the VIDEO concludes and PETE ENTERS the STAGE.)

PETE

At this time ,we'd like to present a special award to a classmate who has taken "school spirit" to new heights. That classmate is Rick Stacy and his brainchild is the Gateway High School Web Page.

In 2009, as Chairman of the 40th Reunion Committee, Rick was looking for the fastest, most efficient way to find, notify and inform members of the Class of '71 of all particulars for the 2011 event, keeping everyone current and on the same page until post time.

It worked brilliantly. Then this internet Webmaster had another idea. With his own seed money, along with contributions from other Gateway alums, created a "digital home" where Gateway grads could stay informed of all class news and information. He built a class roster and a membership that has now grown to over two hundred active members, who can log in and check out what's officially happening in "Gatorland" and in the lives of our members. It's informative, interesting, fun, with more members joining every day and has earned a reputation as a reliable, consistent and valued Gateway institution, which Rick continues generously to fund and maintain. As a class, we wouldn't know what to do without it or him. We sincerely thank Rick for his achievement and continuing efforts to keep us all informed and connected. Ladies and Gentleman, Rick Stacy.

(RICK STANDS to APPLAUSE. As PETE EXITS, RICK SLOAN ENTERS.)

RICK

Hi, everyone, I'm Rick Sloan, Vice President of the Class of '71. Our Student Government was and is the backbone of student life at Gateway. It is modeled after our own democratic institution of government with its own Constitution, by laws and elected officials. Its purpose is to represent the interests and concerns of its students and sponsor events such as Homecoming, dances, pep rallies, concerts charitable events, plus organizing and holding all future class reunions.

Our student government also has a Student Body President, representing all three classes. This office is usually reserved for a Senior. Our Student Body President was Jay Milnes...

... who performed his duty impeccably and served Gateway with the utmost respect and dignity. Jay sadly passed away in 2020, but we would like to pay our respects and recognize him for his outstanding leadership and contributions to Gateway.

(APPLAUSE, then PHOTO OUT.)

Our Class Officers belong only to us...

(PHOTO CLASS OFFICERS UP.)

... Elected by ballot at the beginning of our senior year, they are duty bound to serve the interests of the class by planning and orchestrating all activities for our senior year and beyond. And for over five decades, our Officers have served the class honorably and faithfully and I'm justly proud to state that our administration's record has remained spotless. No sex scandals, malfeasance or conduct unbecoming, not one indictment, motion of censure, nor a single article of impeachment was ever filed against any Class Officer while governing in the 'swamp' that is Student Government politics.' AND not one instance of financial impropriety...

At graduation, the Class of '71 ended up, not only without a budget deficit, but finished in the black with a surplus of thirty-seven dollars and fifty cents...

(APPLAUSE.)

Like the time during morning announcements, when Stu and Jay barricaded themselves in Mr. O'toole's office, locked the door, then got on the PA and gave a full-throated protest on the length of girl's skirts...

... Mr. O'toole was not happy.

And in 1970, a year after Woodstock, Stu successfully lobbied and produced a 'live' rock concert in the auditorium in the middle of a school day. The concert went off without incident until Warren King's rock band played and sang... "Everybody had a hard year, everybody had a good time. Everybody had a "wet dream"

... Mr. O'toole was not happy.

But though it all, the ups and downs, the shining moments and dark days, from Day One of the administration to tonight's 50th Class Reunion, our Student Government has remained intact, stood strong and kept the faith to provide the Great Class of '71 with every blessing it so richly deserves. (As the VIDEO FADES OUT, PETE ENTERS STAGE to APPLAUSE.)

PETE

I'd like to thank everyone who participated and contributed to tonight's program and festivities and again thank our Reunion Committee and volunteers for making our 50th celebration a grand success.

(APPLAUSE.)

I hope everyone had a wonderful time and we look forward to seeing you all again in 2031. The bar is open, and the dance floor is all yours.

(PETE EXITS STAGE as...)

(LOGO UP: BLACK & GOLD GHS LOGO with "GO GATORS" inscription.)

(MUSIC UP: The Beatles, "All Together Now.")

END OF PROGRAM
